Covenant Matters

With the issuing of the current edition of the ONA's Architectural Guidelines several members of the community have come forward to ask me how and when the section on Roofing Materials was changed to exclude asphalt shingles from the list of acceptable roofing materials. Keep in mind that this exception was first made ten years ago in response to the deterioration of a number of slate roofs on Northview Road. These roofs were on homes that were built after WWII and the slate used was much softer than the slate used before the war. For the most part this exception has been granted to homes on Northview Road but rarely, if ever, to homes on other streets.

In 1993 there were no other reasonably economical slate substitutes widely available of which we were aware. Over time, however, other substitutes have become available. Typically these are polymer, rubber and plastic or similar compounds whose color and texture mimic slate quite well. Had this alternative been available ten years ago, I have no doubt that the community and the ONA Board would have decided differently and that asphalt shingles, no matter how high the quality, would never have been permitted.

Through the authority granted the Board through the By-Laws, the Board (and the Covenant Committee) have for at least six years now rejected asphalt shingles as a slate substitute in favor of either natural slate or one of the synthetic slates mentioned above. The recently issued Architectural Guidelines now reflect a practice that has been in effect for some time.

As I mentioned in another issue of The NETWORK, Royal Group (the manufacturer of DuraSlate) and EcoStar (the manufacturer of Majestic Slate) each have product lines of synthetic slate that are now being approved by the ONA for some replacement roofs. We have also observed a great deal of misunderstanding about replacement windows. At one time vinyl windows were categorically denied, in part because they did not meet quality standards comparable to painted wood windows. Today that is not necessarily the case. However, it is true that most, if not all, vinyl constructed windows lack true divided light. It is not enough for these windows to have internal grids sandwiched between two layers of glass. These products fail to provide the shadow lines and expressed muntins that true divided light windows provide and this is the primary reason for rejecting many of the window replacement submissions that are received by the Covenant Committee and the ONA Board. Vinyl clad wood windows often have grille options, such as the Renewal by Andersen, and it is generally possible to get full divided light grilles while still getting the benefits of insulated glass.

You may wish to consider applying for State and/or Federal Historic Tax Credits, each of which is equal to 20% of the value of the work, to assist you in paying for a new roof or windows. Some window replacements, as long as they mimic historical precedents for your particular house, have been granted these tax credits. However, I cannot warrant that this will be true in every instance and it would be wise to check into it before you start counting your refund. Ray Goodrow of the Maryland Historic Trust is the person you should contact for more information. You will find information about Federal, State and Local Tax Credits there, as well as phone numbers.

And, remember, one of the reasons that most of us found this community so appealing in the first place was because of the abundance of quality architectural features that are lacking in so many other areas around Baltimore.

Garden Notes

NORTHWOOD GARDEN CLUB



Wow! Talk about a growth spurt! Have you taken particular notice of the amount of new foliage on many of our shrubs and evergreens? Everything seems to have burst forth in response to the tremendous amount of rainfall we have had. There seem to be more blossoms on the flowering plants. Our pruning skills will be put to the test this season. If you need to improve your knowledge of pruning, now is the time to do it before your garden gets out of hand. Purchase one of the “how to” booklets at your garden store and digest it before you “hack and whack” yourself into an expensive mistake. Proper pruning forms the foundation of your landscape. Do not shear everything into a ball. Do not cut the bottom branches out of evergreens. Do not cut tree branches indiscriminately. Read and study proper pruning techniques before you pick up the saw, shears or pruner. If you have engaged the services of a “landscaper” and you see these things being done, perhaps he’s just a grass cutter after all, with little knowledge of horticulture.

Recently I had a conversation with a licensed arborist who commented on the importance of keeping the base of all trees free of mulch and clippings – too many times he sees mulch heaped up around the tree base. Dampness at the base encourages the growth of fungus which can spread through the tree. Periodically check to make sure the bark at the base of the tree is dry. Remove soil that may have washed onto it.

Isn’t it nice that the crows find a different home during the summer months? Can you imagine how miserable they could make outdoor life for us? So far I have seen no visitors to my hummingbird feeder. Perhaps their migration was altered by the heavy rains. My daughter, living only a few miles away, usually has many visitors to her feeder but so far this year has seen only one. We’ll just have to be patient. Don’t forget to change the nectar every three days or so.

Summer gardening tips:

- * Use Round-Up on sidewalk and street weeds
- * Ortho’s Brush-Be-Gone kills poison ivy — spray only the ivy
- * Cut off branches of trees that protrude over walkways
- * Remove “volunteer” trees as soon as possible
- * Deadhead annuals and perennials for more blossoms
- * Clean and maintain edges of your property – survey regularly
- * To dispose of shrub and tree debris, cut into 2 ft. lengths, tie with cord and put out with the trash for pick-up (City Ordinance)
- * Begin to water regularly all new plantings as needed

The Program Committee of the Northwood Garden Club is busy preparing the Yearbook for 2003-2004. The programs will enhance our knowledge of horticulture and flower arranging and supply a forum where we can work with each other to improve the overall appearance of our community. Original Northwood is currently enjoying a favorable position on the list of desirable Baltimore neighborhoods. Every homeowner who sees to the maintenance of their property and nurtures their landscape, contributes to this desirable position, and deserves thanks from all who are fortunate enough to live here in the “north wood.”

The Treasure's Report...Where is the Money Going?_____

Hello neighbors. In this article, I want to review with you how our money has been spent this year. As you know, spring and summer are busy times for our Maintenance Committee. With all the rain, work to our common areas has been slow but they have managed to have the lawns cut and mulch put in place. To date, we have spent \$595 on the above projects.

Communications, which include the Network as well as our web site, www.originalnorthwood.org, continue to educate and entertain our neighborhood. The cost to maintain these services so far is \$669.38.

We have hosted two social events in 2003. ONA has supported the Wine and Cheese party and the Orioles Night Out by contributing \$627.05.

Our BGE Alley lighting bill has totaled \$86.80 to date. As your Treasurer, I've used \$184.65 to support the 2003 dues mailing. Please see the 'Dues by Street' chart and review the percentage collected by Street. 66% collected is good but not good enough.

If you have not paid your 2003 dues of \$31, please take the time now to consider sending your check. All checks or money orders should be made payable to ONA. You can mail your payment to 1212 Roundhill Road, Baltimore, Maryland 21218-1447. A self addressed return envelope was supplied to you with the original notice, mailed in late March.

The Original Northwood Association owns several accounts, including our checking account and two certificates of deposits. These accounts were held with Allfirst and were recently transferred to Bank of America. The Board found Bank of America to offer better service and lower fees. On average I have to visit the bank once per week and with the transfer of our accounts, it was necessary to plan time away from work to close our old accounts and open the new accounts. Bank of America will issue ONA an ATM card so I can actually walk to the ATM machine at work and make deposits. WOW! how 2003 is that?

Thanks again for the opportunity to serve as your Treasurer and I wish you all a great end of summer.

Setting the Tone for Curb Appeal

Now is the time to assess the exterior of your home to see what everyone else sees. Ask yourself these questions to see if you have curb appeal:

- Does your home need painting?
- Are your doors and welcome mats in good repair?
- Do your windows sparkle?
- Is your sidewalk inviting?

- Have you carefully maintained your front and rear gardens?
- Have you used those charming and sophisticated landscaping ideas you have stored away?

Answering these questions will help you to decide on those things you need to do to add value to your Original Northwood home and increase your curb appeal.

Trash Tips

Regular Trash:

Trash pickup is twice weekly. Households are allowed two trash cans with tight fitting lids. Plastic cans are permitted if solid, but cans with wheels are not recommended as the wheels soon break off. Do not set out garbage in plastic bags except on the morning of pickup to avoid littering by animals and rodents.

Recycled Trash:

Plastic bottles and cans are to be put in blue bags, paper and cardboard in paper bags or tied with cord. Check the recycle schedule provided by City.

Bulk Trash:

Residents are limited to three items per month to be placed in the rear by 7 a.m. on the third Thursday of the month. Call 410-361-9333 to schedule a pickup at least three days in advance.

You must make your own arrangements to have construction materials removed. Hazardous Materials Day is announced by the City in the newspaper.

Tree Limbs, Shrubbery:

Must be cut in two foot lengths and bound with cord into bundles or cut into small pieces and bagged. Leave near trash cans for regular pick-up.

Unused/Unlicensed Vehicles:

Unused and unlicensed vehicles should be kept in a garage. If parked on private property, unused vehicles must rest on a "smooth, dust-free surface" such as asphalt, brick, concrete, macadam or stone block, not simply driven into a yard and covered. The City is authorized to remove all unlicensed vehicles from public and private property.

Be Proactive

Original Northwood neighbors frequently check, change, inspect, drain and repair to eradicate burgeoning maintenance problems. This kind of scrutiny staves off permanent disrepair. Keep in your scope the exterior of your home: roof, gutters, downspouts, vents, painted surfaces, decks, etc. Scrutiny in the interior of your home is just as important: furnace, plumbing, pumps, air-conditioners, etc. Remember with each change of the season there is a need for proactive home maintenance efforts.

If you have some items that you need to dump remember the City of Baltimore Solid Waste Dumping Station. It is located at the corner of 29th Street and Sisson Street (Across from the Burger King between Remington and Hampden neighborhoods) and open Monday thru Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The telephone number there is (410) 396-6070.
